This past year, despite federal funding uncertainty and environmental rollbacks, we found hope in the strength of our support. Like tributaries joining a mighty river, we built momentum from our shared love of these waters. Here's what we accomplished together.

Together with Tribal Nations and local partners, we protected over 1,165 river miles from pollution and harmful development, reconnected over 2,500 river miles through dam removal, and helped Pacific

Northwest salmon return to spawning grounds for the first time in over a century.

That's how our collaborative approach delivers results. Our focus on common-sense solutions and building a coalition of members, decision-makers, community leaders, Tribes, and people across the political spectrum allows us to make meaningful progress.

The successes in the pages ahead highlight the impact of your support across three areas fundamentally important to our shared future — clean water (page 5), abundant wildlife (page 6), and safe, healthy communities (page 7).



Three ways rivers transform lives

American Rivers works to safeguard the 4.4 million miles of rivers and streams essential to our nation's clean drinking water, extraordinary wildlife, and the strength of our communities. Our evidence-based, collaborative approach delivers results across three areas:

O

Clean water

Every living thing depends on clean water for survival. And much of our water comes from rivers. That's why American Rivers protects rivers that are the sources of our drinking water and helps cities use natural approaches to manage pollution — ensuring every person has clean, safe, reliable water.

Abundant wildlife

Free-flowing rivers are vital lifelines for fish, wildlife, and entire ecosystems. Without healthy rivers, there's no water, no wildlife, no life. We protect rivers from pollution and harmful development and restore freshwater habitats so the species that live there can thrive.

Safe, healthy communities

Keeping rivers healthy helps reduce the risk of catastrophic floods, droughts, and fires. American Rivers restores damaged rivers so they can better withstand the pressures of a changing climate. And we remove dangerous, outdated dams that pose safety hazards to people.

Safeguarding New Mexico's waterways

ew Mexico's rivers and streams flow through some of the nation's most breathtaking — and arid — landscapes.

Every drop of water in the desert matters: A significant portion of the state's population relies on rivers and streams for drinking water, and up to 80% of plants and animals in the Southwest depend on rivers for survival.

From its multibillion-dollar recreation economy to the centuries-old farming traditions that define New Mexico's cultural identity, the state's future depends on clean, healthy rivers and streams.

After naming the rivers of New Mexico America's
Most Endangered River in 2024 due to
rollbacks of clean water protections, your
support helped us celebrate outstanding
wins across the state. Together with
local partners, we secured protection
for over 250 miles of rivers in the Rio
Grande, Rio Chama, Cimarron, Pecos,
and Jemez watersheds.

In the Pecos watershed, we helped secure a pause on new mining claims across 165,000 acres, safeguarding the clean water that downstream communities, local farmers, and wildlife need to thrive.

Your investment in clean water is creating wins:

Protecting sources of drinking

water: We advocated for bipartisan legislation to protect and restore the Ohio River, which supports 25 million people across 14 states and countless wildlife species.

Stopping toxic pollution:

Alongside our local partners, we helped build momentum for a landmark agreement to stop millions of gallons of toxic waste that flows daily from California's Tijuana River into the Pacific Ocean.

Empowering nationwide river protection: We launched a groundbreaking data hub to identify and guide protection of our nation's most valuable rivers.

Fish and wildlife on the rebound

ome wildlife comebacks take decades. Others happen in weeks. Less than a month after the world's largest dam removal project was completed, Chinook salmon returned to the upper Klamath basin for the first time in over a century — showing us that dam removal is the fastest, most effective way to bring rivers back to life.

The Klamath River winds from Oregon's Cascade Mountains through northern California to the Pacific Ocean. Once home to the nation's third-largest salmon runs, the river sustains Tribal communities who have depended on its salmon for thousands of years and continue to care for the ecosystem today. Four massive dams blocked migration and created stagnant reservoirs with lethally hot temperatures and toxic algae, contributing to the rapid decline of salmon in the watershed.

This historic dam removal and restoration project demonstrates the power of collaborative action.

The decades-long effort was led by Tribal Nations
— including the Yurok, Karuk, Klamath, Hoopa, and Shasta Tribes — with American Rivers as a key partner alongside farmers, anglers, and conservationists.

Thanks to supporters like you who made this work possible, thousands of salmon have already returned, with hundreds now spawning in the river and its tributaries.

While the watershed's full recovery will take decades, these promising results remind us that nature is always ready to rebound — we just need to give it the chance.

Your generosity is helping wildlife recover:

Creating sanctuary for endangered birds: Your contributions helped advance the largest wetland restoration in the history of Yosemite National Park, creating essential habitat for great grey owls and little willow flycatchers.

Reviving North America's largest salamanders:

Your support helped remove another dam on North Carolina's Watauga River. This opened 36 miles of habitat for eastern hellbenders, which had been proposed for listing as an endangered species.

Bringing river herring back: After American Rivers helped remove three major dams on Maryland's Patapsco River, scientists made an exciting discovery. They found river herring eggs upstream for the first time — a hopeful sign that this keystone Chesapeake Bay species is recovering.

Ensuring strong, healthy communities

Spotlight: Pike River, Wisconsin

he Root Pike Watershed spans southeastern Wisconsin, flowing through urban and agricultural landscapes before reaching Lake Michigan.

For decades, development and agricultural runoff have left the South Branch of the Pike River severely damaged and polluted, impacting thousands of people across multiple communities. This watershed's restoration is essential for the health and safety of not only residents, but also the Great Lakes ecosystem.

Your support enables American Rivers to provide free technical expertise to our watershed partners. Working with the Root-Pike Watershed Initiative Network and other partners, we helped secure municipal leaders' support to restore 215 floodplain acres along the Pike River.

For every \$1 INVESTED in disaster preparedness, we SAVE \$13 in damages and cleanup.

The project will restore the stream channel and nearly 200 acres of wetlands and create new public parkland and multi-use trails connecting neighborhoods to the lakefront. It will also prevent an estimated

1,000 tons of sediment from reaching Lake Michigan annually.

For years, we've partnered with cities and towns to prioritize natural infrastructure solutions that meet community needs while protecting families from flooding.

Your commitment to community health and safety is making a difference:

Protecting communities from flooding:

We secured a transformational \$1.2 million grant to support our National Floodplain Restoration

Program — helping communities across the country manage flooding naturally while restoring vital habitat for wildlife.

From polluted to swimmable: American Rivers helped amplify Portland's progress as a "Swimmable City," shining a spotlight on the Willamette River as part of our commitment to making every river clean, safe, and fun for everyone.

The only organization building political power for rivers


Rivers make life possible — but across our country, many rivers are at a breaking point. The problems facing our rivers are urgent, but not inevitable.

The American Rivers Action Fund focuses on four high-impact strategies:



Public ballot measures:

We back locally led initiatives that deliver wins for clean water and local economies.



State and local advocacy:

We advance forward-looking water policy.



Messaging and narrative change:

We invest in researchbacked communications and storytelling that connects healthy rivers to healthy communities, strong economies, and shared stewardship of our outdoor heritage.



Building champions:

We support elected leaders who champion river priorities — from local officials to members of Congress.



Winning for water

We recently helped pass Colorado's Proposition JJ with 76% support, working with partners such as the Colorado Cattlemen's Association to secure funding for river health and infrastructure. The measure had broad bipartisan backing.

We also launched a research project to equip partners and policymakers with messaging strategies proven to bridge divides.

Looking forward, our aim is to make river protection a political norm, from statehouses to the national stage.
